President's message:

"Christmas with the Kranks," a film based on John Grisham's book *Skipping Christmas*, is one of my holiday favorites. In fact, if you were to ask me how many times I have watched it, I would plead the "fifth." The premise of the story is simple at first glance—a suburban couple, whose daughter has joined the Peace Corps, decides to "skip the rituals of Christmas" and take a cruise. After all, it's nobody else's business how they choose to spend their holiday, is it?

Personal choices should be just that, right? How we celebrate or not celebrate holidays, whom we invite to parties or other occasions, when we put up and take down holiday decorations, what we eat or don't eat—all personal choices and all nobody else's business. Well, not so fast. Just as Nora and Luther Krank learn early on that "no man (or, in this case, a suburban couple) is an island,"* we, too, often find that our "personal choices" can have a major impact on others. John Donne understood that and beautifully illustrates the concept in his "Meditation 17,"* another of my favorites, by the way. Though Donne's work, literarily speaking, is certainly at a higher level than Grisham's, both, in their own way, show us that "if a clod be washed away to the sea, Europe (or any other place) is the less (for it)," or, if you prefer, choosing to "skip Christmas" or making any other personal choice will have an impact.

During the past two years, we, not of our choosing, have been forced to "skip" many occasions. We have missed holiday celebrations, funerals and weddings and baptisms, vacations, lunch with friends, and on and on. And we have all felt the ill effects of separation from those we love and the things we love to do, but we learned valuable lessons, too. We were reminded of the value of *being with* those we love and *doing* the things we love. An even deeper appreciation for those "clods," metaphorically speaking, and traditions that had been lost to us developed in our hearts and minds.

Now, though we are still in the throes of this seemingly never-ending pandemic, we are able to make more personal choices as to how we spend our time and where we spend our time and with whom we spend our time. Let's not waste the time and opportunity we have been given to be as fully involved in the lives of others as much as possible. While both time and opportunity vary greatly among
