

Dear Sisters,

(However, the few times I have watched HGTV, mostly in doctors' offices, I can't help noticing how many shows are highly competitive. (Hmm, maybe I should give that network another try.)

Growing up with four older brothers, I had the choice of playing games with them or being by myself playing dolls. (Guess which one I chose!) Everything we did became a competition—tag football, cow pasture softball (This one took great agility!), "tree tag," "King-of-the-Hill," any card or board game—everything! Seeing who could run home the fastest from our bus stop was a daily occurrence.

At the time, I was unaware of the "bigger picture" of what sports/competition could be. I just wanted to play. Now, though, being older and, hopefully, a little wiser, I see sports and competition in other ways than just winning or losing. I am still as competitive as I always have been, but I have learned to temper that with more understanding and compassion for the toll competition can take on athletes, especially younger ones.

Naomi Osaka and Simone Biles, both number one in their sports and two of the most recognized and revered athletes in the world, chose to "take a break" from competition, Naomi from tennis and Simone from some gymnastic events at the Olympics. The backlash these young women endured from around the world, from within their own sports, from those who know absolutely nothing about...well, nothing about anything...took to social media and mass media to castigate them for "quitting," "being cowards," "letting their countries down," "being unpatriotic, selfish, spoiled, ungrateful." The diatribes against these lovely young women had no boundaries.

President's Message continued:

A number of years ago, I may have joined in the chorus of harsh criticism. Thankfully, I have grown a little wiser. (I know I've grown a little older.) Without even realizing what they had done, their actions brought conversations about mental health out in the open, where it should be. These young ladies NEEDED A BREAK, so they took it. By doing so, they shed light on the damage that is done when one's mental health is not addressed.

Good for them but not so good for Olivia Podmore, a New Zealand cyclist, who lost at the 2020 (2021) Olympic Games. In August, she committed suicide. She was 24 years old. Her last words: "Sports is an amazing opportunity for many people to display their talents. It is also a battle." She lost that battle.

Gratefully, while many were lashing out at Naomi and Simone, others were offering them their full support. Mental health was finally "out in the open." Entire programs were dedicated to this issue. There are and always will be those who see mental illnesses as weaknesses, but others are seeing them for what they are—real illnesses which, left untreated, are dangerous and, sadly, too often fatal.

NC DKG's new president, **Beth Winstead**, is making mental health a priority for her biennium. She is offering monthly a calendar with each day suggesting a way for us to take care of our own mental health, as well as that of our sisters'. To paraphrase Olivia Podmore's final words, "(Being an educator) is an amazing opportunity for many people to display their (devotion and expertise to every person with whom they have been entrusted). It is also a battle." Let's not lose this battle!

Let's take care of ourselves and of our sisters and not be ashamed to ask for help when we are struggling. Let's offer help when we see a colleague struggling. Keep mental health issues "out in the open." Some school systems offer free or reduced costs for seeing a licensed therapist. Take advantage of the opportunity for yourself and recommend it to others. (Mine did, and over the years I encouraged a number of my colleagues to seek therapy. Thankfully, when I was experiencing an unrecognized deep depression after my niece was murdered, a dear friend and officemate said to me, "If you don't go for help yourself, I will drag you there." I had seen her stand up to the biggest, meanest, most threatening boy in school and watch him back down. I went.)



Sale of International
Headquarters Is Complete

DKG has been involved in the process of selling the international headquarters building for the past two years. That process has been completed, and the sale was final on September 1, 2021. The conversations surrounding next steps will now transition into action as the Administrative Board finalizes plans to move to a new site.

A meeting of the International Administrative Board was called in August to determine a plan for the transition to a new office space. The Board determined it would be in the Society's best interests to lease office space for the immediate future. Due to the dynamic nature of the Austin area real estate market, an ad hoc committee was appointed to approve potential lease options.

Members may inquire about how the proceeds from the sale will be managed or used. Because the building is considered a permanent asset, the proceeds from the sale of it were appropriately deposited into the Permanent Fund of the Society. The Constitution defines in Article IV how the monies in the Permanent Fund may be used and will be the guide for any future use of the sale proceeds.

A previously appointed ad hoc committee, consisting of board members, members, and staff, is working on a recommendation regarding archiving, preserving and keeping, moving, selling and/or disposing of the furnishings and other items in the building. The recommendation from that committee will be considered by the Board during its next meeting.

Under a lease agreement, the building will be occupied by DKG for six months after the sale. While the six months provides some time to consider all viable options, DKG leaders also realize that time will not allow them to move too slowly. And so, the journey to a new site continues forward with increasing momentum.
